We pray you will continue to strengthen and sustain all those who are serving in response.


We pray for your Holy Spirit's discernment amidst the many choices and decisions facing our national, community and medical leaders.



3. Ricky Manalo is a Paulist Priest in the USA trained in liturgical theology. He is also a prolific composer and a colleague. We met at the American Academy of Religion annual meeting in 2008.

Ricky posted a setting of Psalm 53 (*a psalm for protection*) sung in an abandoned cathedral in Eastern Turkey on *FB*. It is sung for Francis of Rome in Aramaic (likely the language of Jesus and probably a dialect) by Georgians. There are no instruments only human voices:

and we watch while the blind receive their sight the lame walk the lepers are cleansed the deaf hear the dead are raised the poor dance and sing

we watch and we take food we did not grow and life we did not invent and It dawns on us – late rather than soonthat you "give food in due season you open your hand and satisfy the desire of every living thing."

By your giving, break our cycles of imagined scarcity override our presumed deficits quiet our anxieties of lack transform our perceptual field to see the abundance.....mercy upon mercy blessing upon blessing.

Sink your generosity deep into our lives that your muchness may expose our false lack that endlessly receiving we may endlessly give so that the world may be made *Easter new*, without greedy lack, but only wonder, without coercive need but only love, without destructive greed but only praise without aggression and invasiveness.... all things Easter new..... all around us, toward us and
